Think about the following:

"People fall for conspiracies over social media if the information is in more simple language, repeated from several sources and links to people's beliefs," said Danielle McNamara, a psychology professor at ASU.

But people can combat against the dangers of conspiracy theories. Gillmor suggests readers check other sources and remain skeptical in order to debunk conspiracy theories that have yet to be proven (Jimenez 2018).
